SECRETARY'S REPORT – Bonnie Kolowski Minutes from November 18, 2018 Meeting in Omaha, NE were approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Bob Harvey

The financial report was presented. We have a balance of \$23,702.52. It was moved and seconded to accept the financial report. The motion carried.

There were 21 applications for the scholarship. This year's scholarship was awarded to Madigan Brodsky, a senior at Westside High School. Madigan will be attending Stanford University in the fall.

First Parish Meeting House & Church: Welcome Home, Pilgrim!

Last month, at the General Society's Board of Assistants meeting, former Governor General Lea Filson reported on the work underway at OUR Meeting House. With contributions from the membership and a \$2.68 million donation from the town of Plymouth, the site is buzzing with activity! The exterior soon will be free of leaks. Slate roof tiles are being replaced, exterior stone is being cleaned and new mortar is being added. By Christmas, the breathtaking Robinson stained glass windows should be back in place. Threading carefully among the ladders and workers, tours continue -- showing the curious how the site of the original "multi-purpose building" of the Saints and Strangers is being made ready for its expanded educational mission of the 21st century.

As the proud new owners of the Meeting House, you might be asking yourself, why does this building look like this? Was it the style back in 1899? The makers of this house of worship in the New World took their inspiration from the Old World.

Designed in the Romanesque Revival style, the Meeting House was modeled after the church where William Bradford was baptized -- St. Helena's in Austerfield, England. It features an 88' tall Norman tower flanked by faux buttresses. The builders selected this style because it resembled the churches that would be familiar to those who sailed on the Mayflower. Embedded in the floor, and looking right at home, is a stone threshold from just such an old church – the one in Delfshaven where the Pilgrims prayed before departing for England.

The Meeting House features a graceful arched entry (pictured above), adorned with angels and plants. These are carved in Ohio sandstone. Solid oak pocket doors stand sentinel and are decorated with hand-forged and hammered-iron. Above the doors, enshrined in stained glass, are crosses and grapevines symbolizing the sacred. Before setting foot inside, it's important to note the messages on either side of the front doors. On the left is a plaque showing an image of the Mayflower, the Bible, and the lamp of knowledge.

To the right, is the following proclamation:

"The Church of Scrooby, Leyden, and the Mayflower gathered on this hillside in 1620 has ever since preserved unbroken records and maintained a continuous ministry its first covenant being still the basis of its fellowship. In reverent memory of its pilgrim founders this fifth meeting house was erected A.D. MDCCCXCVII."

Inside the vestibule, stone tables continue telling the pilgrim story showing the congregations that sprang from this mother church. The first three elders - William Brewster, Thomas Cushman and Thomas Faunce—are listed here as well. Once inside this lobby space, beautiful Tennessee pink marble (like that found in the U.S. Capitol) is the primary design element. Its lovely sheen and color are repeated in the staircases and the narthex wainscoting. The workmanship and the materials have stood the test of time. Once inside, the church seems to say, 'Welcome home, pilgrim."

General Society's BOA Meeting

During the first week in September, the General Society held its Board of Assistants meeting in Denver, Colorado. I attended as Deputy Governor General, Kathryn Morrissey attended as Assistant General, and Marty Beerman attended as our Historian. This year, we had a record number of attendees, with 217 attending. My husband Bill and I traveled to Colorado, and Kathryn's husband, Dan, also made the trip. Our Governor General, George Garmany, did a great job of leading the Board of Assistants meeting.

Good news for our Society! Marge Hurtuk, our Historian General, reported that applications to our Society have increased by 24.4%, about 3,580 applications, largely expected because of the upcoming 2020 celebrations. Because of the increased applications; however, there is a growing cost for the support staff to process the applications, and it is likely that dues will need to be increased for the National Society to offset the application and approval process. Marty attended the Treasurer's meeting, where the member societies discussed how the higher national dues will impact the individual societies. One issue that was raised was the impact on the individual societies when they will be required to pay higher costs for national dues for the individual life memberships. The need to raise costs for membership was an important topic at the Board of Assistants meeting.

Lea Filson discussed the transfer of the deed for the National Pilgrim Memorial Meeting House in Plymouth to the General Society of Mayflower Descendants. We are now the proud owners of this wonderful historical site! Work is being done to refurbish the building, and it is expected that this will be a great benefit to our Society as we move forward.

One of the most discussed topics was the upcoming 2020 events which will begin in September, 2020. You will find the complete list of events at the GSMD website and look for the Mayflower float in the Rose Bowl Parade!

Pilgrim Utensils



Eating utensils were comprised of a knife and a spoon. Although forks came into Europe through Italy in the 11th Century, they had not made an appearance in England, and were not known to our Pilgrims; they would eat with their spoon, their knife, or their fingers. Napkins were present and the women were instructed to keep the napkins in their laps, while the men were instructed to place theirs over their left shoulder so that the napkin was readily available for fingers and for beards to eliminate trapped pieces of food. Sixth Whedon Scholarship to be awarded at Spring 2020 Meeting

At our spring meeting in April 2020, we will be awarding the sixth Nebraska Society of Mayflower Descendants Burt & Becky Whedon Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$1,620 to a high school senior planning on attending an accredited 4-year college or university.

An avid genealogist, Becky (Allen) Whedon joined the Nebraska Society in 1982, a descendant of Pilgrim Francis Cooke, as well as Pilgrim Richard Warren. Becky served as our Society's historian for 18 years, from 1989 to 2007, completing applications for 167 members. Burt joined the Nebraska Society in 1977, a descendant of John Howland, as well as William Brewster. The Whedons also served the General Society as Deputy Governor General and Assistant General for many years, traveling to Plymouth for Mayflower General Congress and to the annual Board of Assistants meetings around the country. Becky died in Omaha on January 16, 2011, at the age of 84. Burt died in Omaha on April 27, 2011, at the age of 88.

Scholarship applicants must be residents of Nebraska and United States citizens. You will find application info on our website but we summarize it here.

Applications will be evaluated by a written essay, GPA and class rank, ACT or SAT scores, honors received, school or volunteer activities, employment, demonstrated leadership, and a letter of recommendation from a teacher or guidance counselor. Mayflower ancestry is NOT a requirement.

This year's essay topic focuses on the Mayflower Compact.

On Nov. 11, 1620, the Pilgrims composed and signed a document we now know as the Mayflower Compact. Ships visiting Plymouth Colony gave

the Pilgrims the opportunity to write letters to their families in England and Holland. Compose an essay, between 750 and 1,00 words, in the form of a letter to family describing the impact the Mayflower Compact had on the early life of Plymouth Colony. The essay must include references to document the facts in the letter. Essays will be evaluated for content, organization, style, grammar, and creativity. Sources must be cited in appropriate bibliographic style.

UPON OUR JOURNEY, IN A DEWEY, CRAMPED CABIN, MY SON OCEANUS CAME TO LIFE, NAMED AS A TESTAMENT TO THE GREAT SEA ON WHICH HE WAS BORN. WHILE HIS BIRTH BRIGHTENED THE DARK DAYS THAT I HAD TO REMAIN ABOARD THE MAYFLOWER, I WOULD HAVE WISHED THAT STEPHEN DEPART FROM ME IN MIDDLESEX AND THAT I MAKE THE JOURNEY ONCE OCEANUS WAS BORN AND GAINED HEALTH, FOR BOTH HIS SAKE AND MINE. AS YOU KNOW, FOR OUR COLLECTIVE LEVEL OF SECURITY, HE POSITIONED ME TO TRAVEL WITH HIM RATHER THAN LEAVE ME UNAIDED IN ENGLAND WITH ONE CHILD AND ANOTHER ON THE WAY. I WAS BEGINNING TO BECOME CONCERNED REGARDING THE WELL-BEING OF MYSELF AND MY CHILDREN, AS I WAS CONFINED ONLY TO THE DAMP, FILTHY, AND CRAMPED QUARTERS OF OUR VESSEL FOR MONTHS WHILE OUR HUSBANDS EXPLORED THE SHORES OF OUR FORTUITOUS DESTINATION.

WHILE STEPHEN AND THE OTHER MEN, WHO HAVE REMAINED IN ROBUST HEALTH, BUILT LIVING QUARTERS AND STOREHOUSES ASHORE, THOSE WHO HAD FALLEN ILL WITH PNEUMONIA TOOK REST ABOARD THE VESSEL WITH US. PRAYED DAILY THAT STEPHEN REMAIN FAR FROM SICKNESS AND WAS SOON REASSURED AS HIS EXPERIENCE IN HUNTING AND SURVEYING THE NEW WORLD KEPT HIM ALIVE AND IS OF GREAT USE TO ESTABLISHING OUR SETTLEMENT. DISEASE RAN RAMPANT IN THOSE CONDITIONS, AND I WAS FORCED TO KEEP TO MYSELF TO AVOID THE EVER-LOOMING THREAT OF DEATH. ESPECIALLY WITH AN INFANT AND TODDLER BY MY SIDE. ONLY A MONTH AFTER OUR LANDING DID DOROTHY BRADFORD FALL UNEXPECTEDLY FROM THE RAILING OF THE SHIP INTO THE ICY WATERS OF THE HARBOR BENEATH. I DID NOT WITNESS THE ACCIDENT, BUT WAS MOVED BYHER DEATH, AS I BEGAN TO QUESTION MY OWN ABILITY TO SURVIVE AND PROVIDE FOR STEPHEN AND MY CHILDREN, AS WELL FACED

TORMENTS IN MY DREAMS. I OFTEN WONDERED HOW LONG UNTIL MY FEET WOULD TAKE THEIR LAST STEPS ON THE FLOORBOARDS OF OUR SHIP BEFORE STEPPING ON SOLID EARTH.

I, ALONG WITH MANY OF THE OTHER WOMEN ABOARD, WAS NOT EXPECTANT OF PROLONGED STAY ABOARD THE SHIP, AS OUR ASSEMBLY HAD OBTAINED A CHARTER FROM THE VIRGINIA COMPANY OF LONDON. OUR PREDETERMINED DESTINATION WAS IN THE ESTABLISHED COLONY OF VIRGINIA, FROM WHERE STEPHEN RETURNED SIX YEARS AGO. WHILE OUR SHIP'S CHARTER GAVE PERMISSION TO INSTITUTE A SETTLEMENT IN THE NORTHERN REACHES OF THE COMPANY'S JURISDICTION, DUE TO A LATE DEPARTURE AND ROUGH STORMS, WE ARRIVED MUCH LATER AND MUCH FARTHER NORTH THAN WE ANTICIPATED. AFTER ATTEMPTING TO SAIL SOUTH TO VIRGINIA, IT WAS DECIDED BY THE MEN AND THE CAPTAIN TO REMAIN IN THIS LOCATION. UPON THE ONSET OF THIS PREDICAMENT, I LEARNED FROM MY SPARSE CONVERSATIONS WITH STEPHEN SMALL DETAILS **REGARDING POLITICS OF AN ENSUING DEBATE,** WHICH WAS RECENTLY RESOLVED. I KNOW YOU HAVE ALWAYS BEEN INTERESTED IN THE MACHINATIONS OF SUCH AFFAIRS, SO I WILL RELATE THEM TO YOU NOW BY MY BEST ABILITY.

ON ACCOUNT OF OUR UNEXPECTED DESTINATION, QUESTIONS WERE RAISED REGARDING THE ABILITY OF STEPHEN AND OTHER MEN HIRED BY THE COMPANY OF MERCHANT ADVENTURERS OF LONDON IN ASSERTING LEGITIMATE AUTHORITY IN GOVERNING OUR SETTLEMENT'S AFFAIRS. THE AUDACITY OF THESE STRANGERS IN ASSUMING DOMINANCE OVER THE MEN WHO HAVE FINANCED THIS VENTURE IS APPALLING! MORE IMPUDENT, STEPHEN CLAIMS, WAS THE DIVISIVE NATURE BY WHICH THEY ANTAGONIZE THE SEPARATISTS FROM LEIDEN, URGING FOR MUTINY. MY HEART TREMBLED AT THE POTENTIAL FOR POSSIBLE DANGEROUS DISSENT. ESPECIALLY WHEN THE SURVIVAL OF MY FAMILY HANGS IN THE BALANCE. I WAS RELIEVED TO HEAR FROM STEPHEN THAT A CONSENSUS WAS REACHED IN UNDERSTANDING THAT PERPETUATING THE SURVIVAL OF OUR WHOLE ASSEMBLY IS DEPENDENT ON DISREGARDING OUR DIFFERENCES. NOT JUST WAS OUR PHYSICAL SURVIVAL AT STAKE, BUT THE SURVIVAL OF ANY COHESIVE, ORGANIZED

SETTLEMENT. BY THE WRITINGS OF A MAN NAMED WILLIAM - I DO NOT RECALL IF STEPHEN CLARIFIED HIM AS BREWSTER OR BRADFORD - ALL THE MEN SIGNED AN AGREEMENT THAT IS BEING CALLED THE MAYFLOWER COMPACT, WHICH AUTHORIZES OUR LEADERS TO ESTABLISH LAWS.

ALTHOUGH IT WAS SIGNED A LITTLE OVER A MONTH AGO. THE IMPACTS HAVE TAKEN HOLD UNLIKE ANYTHING I HAVE EVER BEEN FAMILIAR WITH IN ENGLAND. IN THE OPINION OF STEPHEN AND MANY OTHER OF THE **ENGLISHMEN, THE SEPARATISTS HAD A LARGE** INFLUENCE IN THE CRAFTING OF THE GOALS AND STANDARDS OF THE COMPACT, AS THEY UNDERSTANDABLY TURNED TO THE MODEL OF THEIR OWN CHURCHES FOR DIRECTION. AS LOYAL SUBJECTS OF KING JAMES, STEPHEN HAS MADE IT COMPREHENSIBLE TO ME THE NECESSITY IN DOCUMENTING SUCH A CONSENSUS IN ORDER TO MAINTAIN THE PURPOSE OF OUR ENTERPRISE: TO BENEFIT ENGLAND AND FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF GOD'S GLORY. AS I TEND TO THE FIRE IN OUR SMALL, ONE ROOM BOARD DWELLING, MY EARS SWELL WITH A TERM I HAVE HEARD TIME AND TIME AGAIN: CIVIL BODY POLITIC. STEPHEN HAS ALSO DESCRIBED THE NECESSITY OF THIS IDEAL TO ME; THE OATH OF THE SIGNATORIES IN ADOPTING AND OBEYING WHATEVER LAWS ARE NECESSARY TO MAINTAIN THE SAFETY AND SECURITY OF OUR SETTLEMENT AND TO ENSURE THE PROSPERITY OF ITS FUTURE. I AM CURRENTLY WRITING TO YOU WHILE STEPHEN ATTENDS AN ASSEMBLY OF OUR SETTLEMENTS **GENERAL COURT. JUST YESTERDAY JOHN** CARVER WAS ELECTED AS OUR GOVERNOR, WHO WILL PRESIDE OVER OUR SETTLEMENT AND AUTHENTICATE THE LAWS PASSED THROUGH THIS "BODY POLITIC." TO MY UNDERSTANDING, IT OPERATES IN A SIMILAR WAY TO HOW SOME SEPARATISTS ELECT THEIR OWN MINISTERS BY THE MAJORITY AND **GOVERN THEMSELVES.**

As I conclude these accounts of our Journey and New Home, I Remain Thankful for My good health, the Enduring Nature of My Husband, and the Lives of My Children. I Miss you dearly AND PRAY TO GOD THAT YOU REMAIN IN GOOD CONDITION AND HAPPINESS.

Parish Meeting House: Why Should We Care?

I recently was asked – wouldn't the Society have been better served by tearing down the old Meeting House and using the money to erect a modern building? Certainly, a new facility would more easily accommodate technology and the current membership in a comfortable way -- without concerns for future maintenance and the other inconveniences that come with old buildings.

Aside from the fact that the congregation never would have transferred ownership under those conditions, I found myself thinking I could have done better explaining why buying this stately – but neglected—old building was a good idea. I mumbled something about the Society's members having a passion for preservation. Maybe I said the Meeting House has a rich history, is full of religious symbolism and is a rare and wonderful example of the Arts & Crafts movement. Not a bad answer—but not a comprehensive one.

Like many people in these situations, later I found a better response. The answer was in the words of two men – one from the past and one from the present. In 1899, the Pilgrim Society President Arthur Lord said the following at the dedication of this Meeting House:

"To this generation came the duty and the opportunity to erect upon the ruins of the old church, a memorial, simple yet enduring, to the religious life of its founders, the last and best of the great memorials to the Pilgrims at Plymouth ... Long may it stand, sustaining, elevating and inspiring the life and thought of this community, its portals ever open to the 'new light yet to come.' "

Later --114 years later -- First Parish Minister Ed Hardy said:

"This monument should stand not for perfection, not for a particular religion, or a particular politic, but for human hope, for the desire to live a fuller life of freedom – economic freedom, political freedom, and religious freedom. This is holy ground – the holy ground of hope. The holy ground of human capacity."

My cousins, this is the reason I believe we saved the Meeting House and are continuing to raise funds to turn it into a place that tells the story of our ancestors yearround. This old building is being re-purposed for a new mission. It will speak eloquently to future generations about what we thought was important and what we wanted to leave as our legacy.
