THIS YEAR'S ESSAY TOPIC FOCUSES ON THE MAYFLOWER PILGRIMS:

CHOOSE ONE OF THE 51 MAYFLOWER PASSENGERS WHO LEFT DESCENDANTS AND WRITE ABOUT HIS OR HER CONTRIBUTION TO PLYMOUTH COLONY AND HIS OR HER PLACE IN HISTORY.

APPLICANTS WERE ASKED TO COMPOSE AN ESSAY, BETWEEN 750 AND 1,000 WORDS, IN THE FORM OF A LETTER TO FAMILY IN ENGLAND DESCRIBING THE IMPACT THE MAYFLOWER COMPACT HAD ON THE EARLY LIFE OF PLYMOUTH COLONY. THE ESSAY INCLUDED REFERENCES TO DOCUMENT THE FACTS IN THE LETTER.

ESSAYS WERE EVALUATED FOR CONTENT, ORGANIZATION, STYLE, GRAMMAR AND CREATIVITY. SOURCES WERE CITED IN APPROPRIATE BIBLIOGRAPHIC STYLE. New York, January 1, 1864

"A happy new year" to thee, my own beloved Elizabeth Cady Stanton,

I hope this bright but cold morning finds thee brilliant as usual and enriched with many warm friends. Remember, among them all, thou shall not find one who loves thee more devotedly or would do more to render this and all thy future years "happy", than him whose hand traces these lines.

As I reflect upon the events of 1863: the Emancipation Proclamation, the Battle of Gettysburg, and our fight for justice for women and African Americans, it brings to mind our descendant, William Brewster, who came to these shores on the Mayflower. I am filled with a deep sense of gratitude for the sacrifices he made and the legacy he left behind. It is a legacy that hath shaped this country. I am inclined to believe the ideals being fought for in this War of Rebellion and those articulated in the Mayflower Compact, both represent important moments in American politics and the ongoing struggle to create "a more perfect union".

If thee will recall, William Brewster made significant contributions to the Plymouth Colony and played a crucial role in shaping the early history of the colonies. He left an indelible mark on both religious and political institutions.

As an elder of the Separatist congregation, Brewster shaped the religious beliefs and practices of the Plymouth Colony and played an essential role in the establishment of the first church. His influence can be seen in the development of Congregationalism, a form of Protestantism that emphasized the independence of individual churches. He was known for his strong commitment to religious freedom and his belief in the autonomy of local churches. His influence can be seen in the development of the New England town meeting system, which emphasized local self-government and direct citizen participation in decision-making. He established a strong sense of community and shared purpose among the settlers. This sense of unity helped to create a strong and stable foundation for the early years of the colony.

Oh, Elizabeth! My heart weeps to think that the foundation is being tested. We must never forsake the fight for equality and justice in this War of Rebellion. Rather, look to William Brewster as a source of inspiration and guidance. His commitment to freedom, justice, and cooperation are values that we must continue to uphold and work towards. We must ever be cognizant of Brewster's legacy which extends far beyond his contributions to the Plymouth Colony and serves as an inspiration for those, like us, who value freedom and democracy. Brewster's legacy can be seen in the lasting impact of Congregationalism and the New England town meeting system on American religious and political institutions.

I state emphatically that he must be remembered as a symbol of the values and principles that were central to the founding of the United States. He was a strong advocate for individual freedom, religious liberty, and the right to self-governance, all of which are fundamental to our democracy.

When I think upon it, I am inspired by his resilience and determination.

My dear Elizabeth, I feel a sense of responsibility to honor his legacy by living my life with purpose and integrity. I wish to make a positive impact on the world, just as he did. I will endeavor to continue our current social reforms including women's rights and suffrage, and abolitionism with thee by my side.

It is my fervent desire that William Brewster will now and forever continue to inspire those who fight for social justice today and in the future.
